This has been strongly contested by biographer Trevor Hamilton and the psychical researcher Alan Gauld. Parapsychologist Fraser Nicol published an extremely negative review of Hall's book on Gurney, this caused a threat of a libel action from Hall." [Wilip.].

Edmund Gurney (1847-1888), Psychologist, parapsychologist, was an English psychologist and parapsychologist. At the time the term for research of paranormal activities was "psychical research". He died from an accidental overdose of chloroform.








"Trevor Henry Hall (1910–1991) was a British author, surveyor, and sceptic of paranormal phenomena. Hall made controversial claims regarding early members of the Society for Psychical Research. His books caused a heated controversy within the parapsychology community. He had a deep interest in magic and mystery. Hall was a student in psychical research at Trinity College, Cambridge (1954–56). His knowledge of conjuring and magic helped him discover the tricks of mediums, many of whom had been caught in fraud. Hall was an ex-member and critic of the Society for Psychical Research and published a series of skeptical books on the paranormal and psychical research. He was a collector of magic books and was a member of The Magic Circle. He also wrote three books on the higher criticism of Sherlock Holmes." [Wilip.].


Ada Goodrich Freer (1857-1931) "was a medium, clairvoyant, psychical researcher and author. Much of her work was published under the pseudonym Miss X. Freer was investigated by the Society for Psychical Research and, under strong suspicion of fraud, she was disowned from the Society. She was later caught cheating at a séance and subsequently emigrated to Jerusalem and, later, the United States."

"Joseph Maximilian Hark (known as Max Hark) was born on June 4, 1849 in Philadelphia to Joseph and Maria Louise (Bute) Hark. From 1865-1870 Max attended Moravian College and Theological Seminary. He was ordained as a deacon on September 7, 1873 in Nazareth by Bishop H.A. Schultz. He was married to Pedronilla/Matilda Theresa Crosta on October 7, 1873 with whom he had three children, Hugo Crosta (November 1, 1874), Hilda Theresa (January 1, 1886), and Anna Amelia (August 27, 1890). Hark was consecrated as a presbyter on May 20, 1875 in Lebanon, Pa. by Bishop E. de Schweinitz. He served as a pastor for several Moravian communities: Lebanon, Pa. (1873-1876 and again May 8, 1910- March 4, 1917), Philadelphia (Second Church) (1876-1881), and Lancaster, Pa. (1881-1893). He served as the principal of the Moravian Young Ladies Seminary in Bethlehem (1893- June 1909). After a brief retirement in Mt. Gretna after his service to the Seminary, Max returned to serve again as a minister in Lebanon. He was engaged throughout his life in literary work (some of which can be found in this collection) and helped edit "The Moravian" from 1881-1885. He received a D.D. from Franklin Marshall College in 1893. After his last appointment in Lebanon Hark retired to Mt. Gretna and later went to visit with his son, Dr. Hugo Hark, in St. Croix, Virgin Islands, West Indies. While in St. Croix Joseph Maximilian fell ill and died on July 24, 1930. 




In this book, the first full study of Hartley's thought, Allen brings to life this important but neglected theorist of the mind. He offers a brief but thorough biographical study and a detailed analysis of Hartley's most important work, his 1749 Observations on Man, His Frame, His Duty, and His Expectations, which deeply influenced both Priestley and Coleridge, as well as Benjamin Rush. Hartley was a typical Georgian polymath, who practiced medicine without benefit of a medical degree, and who read widely in both theology and natural [End Page 602] philosophy. His friends included the diarist John Byrom, the clergyman and natural philosopher Stephen Hales, and the

physician George Cheyne. Hartley was a strong supporter of Joanna Stephens, whose medicine for the stone, he claimed, cured him, and he was one of those who verified its effectiveness before Parliament in 1740. He took part in the mystical religious circles centered on William Law and Cheyne, while at the same time being thoroughly imbued with Newton's natural philosophy. Hartley is remembered, if at all, for his concept of the association of ideas: the notion that ideas bring to mind other ideas in a complex chain of associations. But Allen demonstrates that this is only one aspect of his thought. Observations on Man, as the rather odd but wholly eighteenth-century title indicates, is about much more than a theory of psychology. Hartley began by describing a physiological theory of sensation derived from Newton's theory of the ether. In his queries to the *Opticks*, Newton had tentatively ascribed the transmission of sensations to the vibration of an (or the?) ether along the nerves. George Cheyne developed this idea in his English Malady (1733), a source that Hartley certainly used, although Allen does not mention it. Allen's analysis, however, goes on to draw parallels with Newton's theories of colors and of musical harmonics, both also based on a notion of vibrations. Allen then connects Hartley's neurophysiology to his doctrine of association, and a dense and complex analysis of this doctrine forms the center of the book. Here Allen writes as a philosopher rather than a historian, and this section is at times heavy going, although always perceptive. He spends less time on what he calls Hartley's construction of the self, and his prescriptions for human behavior. To my mind, Allen does not pay enough attention to Hartley's religious ideas and associations, which permeate his entire work. His analysis of Hartley's concept of "annihilation of self," in which his religious ideas are most evident, is merely adequate and contains several minor errors (for example, George Garden died in 1733, not 1717). John Wesley, who was Hartley's contemporary, is barely mentioned, although he was influenced by many of the same authors Hartley read and would have been a fruitful source for comparison. Readers of the Bulletin may also wish that Allen had integrated Hartley's medical practice more fully into his analysis. Hartley was a practicing physician for almost thirty years--the last fifteen in Bath, that hotbed of neuroses--and surely connections can be made between his theories and his practice. Martha Webb indeed initiated such connections in an article in this very journal a decade ago. 1 Nonetheless, I do not wish to detract from the great value of Allen's thorough and learned study. Students of eighteenth-century psychology and philosophy will find much to learn in it, and it is beautifully produced." - Anita Guerrini, Bulletin of the History of Medicine, vol. 74, no. 3.








"Ranging in subject from England's poor laws to the Human Genome Project, The Rhetoric of Eugenics in Anglo-American Thought is one of the first books to look at the history and development of the eugenics movement in Anglo-American culture. Unlike other works that focus on the movement's historical aberrancies or the claims of its hardline proponents, this study highlights the often unnoticed ways in which the language and ideas of eugenics have permeated democratic discourse. Marouf A. Hasian, Jr. not only examines the attempts of philosophers, scientists, and politicians to balance the rights of the individual against the duties of the state, but also shows how African Americans, Catholics, women, and other communities--dominant and marginalized--have appropriated or confronted the rhetoric of eugenics.

Hasian contends that "eugenics" is an ambiguous term that has allowed people to voice their concerns on a number of social issues--a form of discourse that influences the way ordinary citizens make sense of their material and spiritual world. While biological determinism and social necessity are discussed in the works of Plato, Malthus, and Darwin, among others, with theories ranging from equality for all to natural superiority, it is Galton's observations on "positive" and "negative" eugenics that have been widely used to justify a variety of social and political projects--including the sterilization and segregation of the unfit, immigration restrictions, marriage regulations, substance abuse, physical and mental testing, and the establishment of health programs that sought to improve "hygiene." Women, African Americans, and other marginalized communities, for instance, have at times lost reproductive rights in the name of "liberty," "opportunity," or "necessity."

Eugenical arguments are more than a creation of pseudo-science or misapplied genetical analysis, Hasian determines; they are also rhetorical fragments, representing the ideologies of multitudes of social actors who, across time, have reconfigured these ideas to legitimize many agendas." – University of Georgia Press.

"Hevelius's first major research project was mapping the moon. He set out to observe and draw every phase of the Moon, a task that took him years because of the variable weather in Gdansk. In 1647 he published Selenographia, sive lunae description. 



"Norris, John (1657–1712), Church of England clergyman and philosopher, was born on 2 January 1657 at Collingbourne Kingston, Wiltshire, the third surviving child of John Norris (bap. 1614, d. 1682) and his wife, Elizabeth (d. 1696). His father was vicar of Collingbourne Kingston under the Commonwealth and he moved to the living of Aldbourne, Wiltshire, in 1660. Norris was educated at Winchester College and entered Exeter College, Oxford, in 1676. A keen student at both Winchester and Oxford, he early abandoned his inherited Calvinism and concentrated his reading on Platonist authors. On graduating BA in 1680 he was appointed a fellow of All Souls by Archbishop

Sancroft on the recommendation of Thomas Jeames, the warden, during a dispute with the fellows over the filling of the vacancies in the college. Norris always retained a great esteem for All Souls, and the college in turn erected a bust of h His early writings show him to have been at that time a strong tory and high-churchman, but also show that he deliberately turned aside from political involvement. All the writings that he considered to be worth preserving were included in A Collection of Miscellanies, which appeared in 1687. In the Codrington Library when this was built in the following century. . . . Norris's writings have tended to be neglected by historians of philosophy, partly perhaps because of Locke's dismissive attitude and partly because many of his theories are so close to those of Malebranche that it is difficult to disentangle their influence. He has been better treated by historians of literature, who see his poetry, much of which continues to be republished, as marking especially clearly the transition from the spirit of the Renaissance to that of modern times. Much of Norris's poetry, which has its roots in the metaphysical tradition, is somewhat laboured. At his best, however, he has a lyrical spirit, . . . In private life Norris seems to have been a kindly person, a devoted parish clergyman, and the friend and supporter of several of the learned ladies of his time. In the history of English thought he is a transitional figure. In contrast to the Cambridge Platonists he adopted wholeheartedly the Cartesian dualism of mind and matter. His theory of knowledge was a Cartesian Platonism similar to that of Malebranche, to whose more developed theories he was at times too inclined to defer. In the history of English philosophy, religion, and literature he deserves to be remembered." - DNB.
