

Eugène Eric de Henseler ["Eric"], born in Fribourg, 1889 and died in Geneva, 1960. Of a Swiss family originating from Bremgarten, Aarau/Argovie, he was partly educated in Great Britain and also in Fribourg and Lausanne. He was awarded a Ph.D. by the University of Fribourg in 1928 and his doctoral thesis was 'L'ame et le dogme de la transmigration dans les livres sacrés de l'Inde ancienne.' He was an active member of the 'Société théosophique' in Geneva and frequently contributed to articles on theosophy. Most of the books herein can be attributed to his acquisition.

His son, Alexandre Synès de Henseler (born Geneva, 1935 and died in Montreux, 2021) studied Classics and Sanskrit at the University of Geneva and worked on a doctoral thesis on the Pre-Socratics and Upanishads at the University of Oxford. He helped edit the correspondence of Theodore de Bèze. His most recent work was: https://fundamentalphilosophy.blog. Both father and son were avid collectors of publications in the areas of philosophy and religions. Alexandre also wrote under a pseudonym, "Synesios".






Martin van Maële (1863-1926), better known by his pseudonym Martin van Maële, was a French illustrator of early 20<sup>th</sup> century literature. He is renowned for his work in the field of erotic literature. Van Maële worked at Brussels as well as Paris, and his best known work – consisting among other things of an illustrated edition of Paul Verlaine's poems – was published in small, secretive editions by publisher Charles Carrington. 
Noted for his biographical sketches of Saint Basil and the history of the Nicene Creed, French scholar Godefroy Hermant (1617-1690) was an important 17th-century Jansenist historian. His commentary on Basil was published in this 1673 edition.






Editor's copy. The Correspondence de Théodore de Bèze was set up by a Geneva University Foundation and published by Librairie Droz.

Theodore de Bèze, or Beza, was one of the most prominent figures in the Reform movement. He supported Calvin and succeeded him as moderator, i.e. president, of the Company of pastors in Geneva. He relentlessly defended the Calvinist doctrine, the discipline of the Church and its synodal-Presbyterian organization. He left noteworthy historic and literary writings. The only aim of his actions was to strengthen the Reform movement assaulted by Roman Catholicism and rivaled by German Lutheranism. He stayed in Lausanne until 1558 when he settled down in Geneva, where he taught theology and law. He became Calvin's right-hand man.


Thomas William Doane (1852-1885), an American author, is considered one of the most significant contributors to the Free Thought movement, which held the view that belief should be based on the epistemology of scientific and logical laws, rather than on faith. In support of this philosophy, Doane undertook extensive research delving into the parallels between Christianity and preexisting religions from around the world,

ultimately meaning to show the difference between eternal truths, both spiritual and scientific, and fable. Here, in a work first published in 1882, he takes a methodical stroll through each of the most popular Biblical myths from both the Old and New Testaments, including the Flood, the Exodus, Samson, the Star of Bethlehem, baptism, and the temptation of Christ. By providing copious evidence of the preexistence of the morals and indeed, associated details of each, as well as thorough bibliographic information, the fruit of Doane's labor is a fascinating survey of world religions and a compelling critique of the originality of Christian dogma.




PROVENANCE: Moritz Curt Freiherr von Zedtwitz (1851-96): Curt von Zedtwitz attended high school in Zwickau. After graduating from high school in March 1869, he served as a one-year volunteer in the Saxon Army. A law student at the University of Leipzig since 1870, he took part in the Franco-Prussian War. In February 1871 he

became second lieutenant in the reserve, in October 1878 Premier-Lieutenant d. R. and promoted to Rittmeister in June 1885. After the war he moved to the Ruprecht Karls University in Heidelberg and the Friedrich Wilhelms University in Berlin. After passing the First State Examination in Law on July 20, 1874, he entered the judicial service of the Kingdom of Saxony. On March 9, 1878 he passed the assessor's examination.

On April 1, 1878, he was drafted into the Foreign Service (consular career). As an auxiliary agent, he was assigned to Department II (commercial, legal and consular affairs). Admitted to the diplomatic career on April 23, 1879, he was at the Embassy in Saint Petersburg from May 1879 to January 1881. In July 1879 he passed the diplomatic examination. In May 1881 - at the time of Karl von Eisendecher – he came to the embassy in Tokyo as legation secretary. He studied Japanese music and published a collection of Japanese music in 1885. [4] In April 1885 he was sent to the legation in Stockholm and in April 1886 to the legation in Washington, DC relocated. On March 5, 1886, he received the character of Councilor of Legation. In the "Era Bleichröder" he was sent to Mexico City on July 2, 1888 as an envoy. The credentials were handed over on October 22, 1886. On March 28, 1893, he was released from the Reich service.


Curt von Zedtwitz was married since 1890 to Mary Elizabeth Breckenridge Caldwell. Together they purchased Chartreuse Castle in Hünibach, which once housed a massive library. In 1896 Zedtwitz suffered a boating accident and died.







The author, Marie Louis Antoine Gaston Boissier, the renowned French classical scholar, and a passionate archeologist, was one of the most prominent professors of the Collage de France. Of this work, Rand writes, "His interest in both Roman religion and the origins of Christianity finds expression in the splendid volumes on "La Fin du Paganisme" (1891), which have inspired admirable works by French scholars in the same field." 




time" – Hausmann *Dictionaires* p. 2957 (text translated). The work was first issued in 1699.



In 1702, there appeared at The Hague the work which has made Boyer's a familiar name, his Dictionnaire Royal Français et Anglais, divisé en deux parties, ostensibly composed for the use of the Duke of Gloucester, then dead. It was much superior to every previous work of the kind, and has been the basis of very many subsequent French-English dictionaries; the last English unabridged edition is that of 1816. For the English-French section Boyer claimed the merit of containing a more complete English dictionary than any previous one, the English words and idioms in it being defined and explained as well as accompanied by their French equivalents. In the French preface to the whole work, Boyer said that 1,000 English words not in any other English dictionary had been added to his by Richard Savage, whom he spoke of as his friend, and who assisted him in several of his French manuals and miscellaneous compilations and translations published subsequently. The macrostructure and microstructure of the entries in Boyer's Royal Dictionary was copied by Ó. Beaglaoich in his English-Irish Dictionary of 1732.










Stewart Culin (1858-1929) was an American ethnographer and author interested in games, art and dress. Culin played a major role in the development of ethnography, first concentrating his efforts on studying the Asian-Americans workers in Philadelphia. His first published works were "The Practice of Medicine by the Chinese in America" and "China in America: A study in the social life of the Chinese in the eastern cities of the United States", both dated 1887. He believed that similarity in gaming demonstrated similarity and contact among cultures across the world. Korean Games, with comparisons to those of other Asian cultures, were the topic of Culin's first book, published in 1895. This work was inspired by Frank Hamilton Cushing, then of the Bureau of American Ethnology of Washington. Culin became interested in chess and card games and published a paper on the topic in 1886. He worked with Cushing on an article called Arrow games and their variants in America and the Orient. When Cushing became ill, Culin continued the work and eventually published three inter-related papers: American Indian Games (1898), Hawaiian Games (1899) and Philippine Games (1900). [Wikip.].

PROVENANCE: Henri Louis Frédéric de Saussure (1829 -1905) was a Swiss mineralogist and entomologist specializing in studies of Hymenoptera and Orthopteroid insects. He also was a prolific taxonomist. He had nine children including the famous linguist Ferdinand de Saussure (1857) - surely the subsequent owner as the next owner was also a linguist, E.E. De Henseler (Geneva).






First Kennedy issue was 1841-63. Charles Rann Kennedy (1808-1867) was an English lawyer and classicist, best remembered for his involvement in the Swinfen will case and the issues of contingency fee agreements and legal ethics that it involved. In his academic role, he advised the judge Lord Denman in the important parliamentary privilege case of Stockdale v. Hansard. As counsel to Mrs Swinfen, the plaintiff in the celebrated will case Swinfen v. Swinfen (1856), he brought an action for remuneration for professional services, but the verdict given in his favour at Warwick assizes was set aside by the court of Common Pleas, on the ground that a barrister could not sue for the recovery of his fees.










Illustrated by Frank S. Hazenplug (1873/4-1931), was an American artist, engraver, typographer, poster designer, and book illustrator. He began his career in Chicago where a new artistic scene emerged in the early 1890s. Hazenplug is one of the pioneers of a certain graphic design born with Art Nouveau. In 1893, he became one of the graphic designers of the publishing house Stone & Kimball (Chicago), founded by two Harvard scholars, which published very neat books in limited editions.




Johann Peter Adolf Erman (1854-1937) was a renowned German Egyptologist and lexicographer. He became associate professor of Egyptology at the University of Berlin in 1883 and full professor in 1892. In 1885 he was appointed director of the Egyptian department at the royal museum. "The Neuägyptische Grammatik (1880) dealt with texts written in the vulgar dialect of the New Kingdom (Dyns. XVIII to XX). Next followed, in the Zeitschrift für ägyptische Sprache und Alterthumskunde, studies on the Old Kingdom inscription of Unas, and the Middle Kingdom contracts of Assiut, as well as on an Old Coptic text of the 3rd century CE. At this point a papyrus of stories written in the popular language of the Middle Kingdom provided Erman with a stepping-stone from Old Egyptian to the Late Egyptian of the Neuägyptische Grammatik, and gave the connections that would bind solidly together the whole

structure of Egyptian grammar (see Sprache des Papyrus Westcar, 1889). The very archaic pyramid texts enabled him to sketch the grammar of the earliest known form of Egyptian (Zeitschrift d. Deutsch. Morgenl. Gesellschaft, 1892), and in 1894 he was able to write a little manual of Egyptian for beginners (Ägyptische Grammatik, 4th ed., 1928), centering on the language of the standard inscriptions of the Middle and New Kingdoms, but accompanying the main sketch with references to earlier and later forms." 
First edition. Around the turn of the nineteenth century British folklorist and traveler Lucy Mary Jane Garnett (1849-1934) published several books on Turkish folklore and mysticism. Having travelled extensively in the Balkans and Middle East, Garnett was considered an


expert on the cultures in these regions both by fellow folklorists and the wider British audience that read her books. Her knowledge of Greek and Turkish, languages she learned in Smyrna and Salonica, aided her greatly in compiling books such as Greek Folk-Songs from the Turkish Provinces of Greece (1890), The Women of Turkey and their Folk-Lore (1890), Mysticism and Magic in Turkey (1912), Ottoman Wonder Tales (1915) and Balkan Home Life (1917). Together with her publication of reviews and articles on the same subjects in well-known and widely read journals and magazines, Garnett's body of work presented her perspective



on the customs of the Balkans to a large British audience.

Lucy Garnett aimed to supplement the accounts of earlier, mostly male travel writers who visited the Balkans with information about the lives of women, which she thought to be sorely lacking in previous works about the region. She sought not just to educate her fellow countrymen about the folklore of the Balkans, but specifically emphasized the life and status of Balkan women. This presentation will consist of a comparative study of Garnett's statements about her role as a mediator between East and West and the perception of that role and her work by the British press in reviews of her work, in particular The Women of Turkey and their Folk-Lore which includes chapters written by male folklorist John. S. Stuart-Glennie. Specific attention will be paid to the influence of Garnett's co-operation with Stuart-Glennie on her reception in Britain. - Women Writers.





Dwight Goddard "was born in Worcester, Massachusetts in 1861, and became a pioneer in the American Zen Buddhist movement. During his life, he authored and edited nine titles on Buddhism, including "A Buddhist Bible." He influenced Jack Kerouac (1922-1969). In 1954, Kerouac discovered Dwight Goddard's *A Buddhist Bible* at the San Jose Library, which marked the beginning of his study of Buddhism. Between 1955 and 1956, he lived on and off with his sister, whom he called "Nin," and her husband, Paul Blake, at their home outside of Rocky Mount, N.C. The text of the *Hieroglyphica* consists of two books, containing a total of 189 explanations of Egyptian hieroglyphs. The books profess to be a translation from an Egyptian original into Greek by a certain Philippus, of whom nothing is known. The inferior Greek of the translation, and the character of the additions in the second book point to its being of late date; some have even assigned it to the 15th century. The text was discovered in 1419 on the island of Andros, and was taken to Florence by Cristoforo Buondelmonti (it is today kept at the *Biblioteca Laurenziana*, Plut. 69,27).

By the end of the 15th century, the text became immensely popular among humanists and was translated into Latin by Giorgio Valla (in ms. Vat. lat. 3898). The first printed edition of the text appeared in 1505 (published by Manuzio), and was translated into Latin in 1517 by Filippo Fasanini, initiating a long sequence of editions and translations. From the 18th century, the book's authenticity was called into question, but modern Egyptology regards at least the first book as based on real knowledge of hieroglyphs, although confused, and with baroque symbolism and theological speculation, and the book may well originate with the latest remnants of Egyptian priesthood of the 5th century. 
"The second rediscovery of Horapollon is an indirect consequence of the deciphering of the hieroglyphs by Jean-François Champollion in September 1822. Horapollon's treatise, after the enthusiasm of the Cinquecento, prolonged by Kircher's works, had ended up arousing acerbic criticisms in the course of the century, perhaps because it had disappointed the hopes placed in this potential Rosetta stone. Philology, renouncing its vain pretensions to one day penetrate the mysteries of hieroglyphics, then cast a cold and merciless eye on this work and became aware of the limits of this text. The work thus knew a certain discredit: Abbé Jean-Joseph Rive, in an unpublished memoir, followed by Jean-Baptiste Requier in his 1779 translation, saw it as the work of a 15th century forger; the great philologist Friedrich August Wolf, while dating it to the 5th or 5th century, called its author a "miserable bugger (ein lumpichter Kerl)"; Daniel Albert Wyttenbach (1746-1820) attributed it to an inept compiler from the 1st or 5th century. This treatise regained a second vitality when Champollion's work was able to show that it was not a compilation of nonsense, but that, behind the exegeses that could sometimes appear to be frivolous or badly digested, often drawn from Greco-Roman sources, whose descriptions of signs were cluttered, it delivered the value of authentic hieroglyphs, frequently drawn from the repertoire of "cryptograms" of the end of the history of hieroglyphic writing." 




Thomas Inman, MD, was a house-surgeon to the Liverpool Royal Infirmary. He wrote medical papers, but he was also an amateur mythologist, and wrote *Ancient Pagan* and *Modern Christian Symbolism*, first published in 1869 and then again in 1875. In it he elucidated the origins of common symbols, some of them medical. From Godfrey Higgins he derived the suggestion that the key to all mythology is to be sought in phallic worship. Many of the symbols he discusses are in use today. He retired from practice in 1871. [Wikip.].

Albert Félix Ignace Kazimirski or Albin de Biberstein (1808-1887) was a French orientalist and Arabist of Polish origin, author of an Arabic-French dictionary and a number of Arab-French translations, including the *Quran*. 
The work is arranged in two parts: the first, written during the reorganization of the Royal Gallery, is conceived as a popular manual to provide a visual guide to the ancient part of the museum. The second part is based on the rich collection of epigraphs contained within the Stefano Borgia collection, marks a turning point in the studies of Etruscology. Lanzi identified some letters of the Etruscan alphabet, by guessing their derivation from the Greek, identifying the close correlation between

Etruscan and Greek civilization both in the linguistic and artistic field, stylistic and iconographic.

Luigi Lanzi (1732-1810), Jesuit archaeologist, royal antiquarian since 1790, is considered the father of etruscology.







Antoine-Joseph Pernety, known as Dom Pernety (1716-1796), French writer, alchemist, Freemason, he was known early as a Benedictine and a librarian of Frederic the Great of Prussia. He found an alchemy text in the library at Saint-Germain-des-Pres, Paris, and that book heavily influenced this work, and by that of Abbot Lenglet-Dufresnoy, his *Histoire de la Philosophie Hermetique*, 1742. Together with the Polish Count Tadeusz Grabianka, and influenced by the Christian mysticism of Swedenborg, he founded the secret society of "Rite hermétique" or Illuminati of Avignon (1760). The hermetic philosophy of Hermes, which established secret and symbolic relationships between all things, is the basis of alchemy. Pernety used mythology as a guise for presenting a treatise on alchemy and hermetic philosophy.


Preface: "Since the first issue of this work in 1903, but especially within the past few years, its main positions have been brought into extensive discussion by other writers, notably in Germany, where the Christusmythe of Professor Arthur Drews has been the theme of many platform debates. The hypothesis of the Pre-Christian Jesus-God, first indicated in *Christianity* and *Mythology*, and further propounded in the first edition of this book, has received highly important and independent


development at the hands of Professor W. Benjamin Smith in his *Der Vorchristliche Jesus* (1906), and in the later exposition of Professor Drews. Homer Smith has described Robertson as an "outstanding exponent of rationalism and one of the foremost scholars produced in England in the last six decades."

PROVENANCE: Possibly Otto Karmin (1882-1920), translator, journalist, teacher, anarchist and free-thinking activist. Otto Karmin arrived in Geneva in 1898 with his family, began his studies there and obtained Swiss citizenship. In July 1900, he was among the founders of the Réveil socialiste-anarchiste, to which he mainly offered translations. In particular, he was the French translator of L'Anarchisme, by Paul Eltzbacher (Paris, Giard et Brière, 1902). His studies and his activities for the Free Thought led him to many trips: London, Halle, Florence, Paris, Munich, etc. He participated in the foundation of the Ferrer School of Lausanne in 1910 and was the secretary of the International Bureau of the Free Thought during the First World War. His books and articles deal with religious issues and the French Revolution. He died in Geneva.

Fifth edition. Smith (1840-1876), the English Assyriologist, the translator of the great literary epic *Gilgamesh* (discovered by Austen H. Layard in 1849), came from a working-class background. He "spent much of his leisure time in the British Museum galleries where he was noticed by Samuel Birch, Keeper of Oriental Antiquities, and eventually employed as a

"repairer" of cuneiform tablets. Began sorting tablet fragments, copying and collating proofs, famously recognising the "Flood" tablet in 1880. Sponsored by The Daily Telegraph to find more fragments at Nineveh and therefore excavated on behalf of the British Museum. Thus, in November 1873, Smith again left England for Nineveh for a second expedition, this time at the expense of the Museum, and continued his excavations at the tell of Kouyunjik (or Kuyunjik, Nineveh). During his 1874 season he also excavated at Nimrud for a month and acquired a small number of finds during visits to other sites. He published a popular account on these investigations." [British Museum]. Assyrian Discoveries, a handsomely produced book printed at the celebrated Chiswick Press, is that popular account. "In his time no one in England had done more to bring the excitement and significance of archaeological discovery before the public." - ODNB. Following the death of William H. Coxe in 1869, Smith was appointed to the British Museum, Senior Assistant in the Assyriology Department, early in 1870.






First translation of the Greek into French. "His On Mathematics Useful for the Understanding of Plato is not a commentary on Plato's writings but rather a general handbook for a student of mathematics. It is not so much a groundbreaking work as a reference work of ideas already known at the time. Its status as a compilation of already-established knowledge and its thorough citation of earlier sources is part of what makes it valuable.


"The first part of this work is divided into two parts, the first covering the subjects of numbers and the second dealing with music and harmony. The first section, on mathematics, is most focused on what today is most commonly known as number theory: odd numbers, even numbers, prime numbers, perfect numbers, abundant numbers, and other such properties. It contains an account of 'side and diameter numbers', the Pythagorean method for a sequence of best rational approximations to the square root of 2, the denominators of which are Pell numbers. It is also one of the sources of our knowledge of the origins of the classical problem of Doubling the cube.

"The second section, on music, is split into three parts: music of numbers (hē en arithmois mousikē), instrumental music (hē en organois mousikē), and "music of the spheres" (hē en kosmō harmonia kai hē en toutō harmonia). The "music of numbers" is a treatment of temperament and harmony using ratios, proportions, and means; the sections on instrumental music concerns itself not with melody but rather with intervals and consonances in the manner of Pythagoras' work. Theon considers intervals by their degree of consonance: that is, by how simple their ratios are. (For example, the octave is first, with the simple 2:1 ratio of the octave to the fundamental.) He also considers them by their distance from one another.


"The third section, on the music of the cosmos, he considered most important, and ordered it so as to come after the necessary background given in the earlier parts. Theon quotes a poem by Alexander of Ephesus assigning specific pitches in the chromatic scale to each planet, an idea that would retain its popularity for a millennium thereafter.


"The second book is on astronomy. Here Theon affirms the spherical shape and large size of the Earth; he also describes the occultations, transits, conjunctions, and eclipses. However, the quality of the work led Otto Neugebauer to criticize him for not fully understanding the material he attempted to present." [Wikip.]
