

EUGÈNE ERIC DE HENSELER

Eugène Eric de Henseler ["Eric"], born in Fribourg, 1889 and died in Geneva, 1960. Of a Swiss family originating from Bremgarten, Aarau/Argovie, he was partly educated in Great Britain and also in Fribourg and Lausanne. He was awarded a Ph.D. by the University of Fribourg in 1928 and his doctoral thesis was 'L'ame et le dogme de la transmigration dans les livres sacrés de l'Inde ancienne.' He was an active member of the 'Société théosophique' in Geneva and frequently contributed to articles on theosophy. Most of the books herein can be attributed to his acquisition.

Eric's bookplate ["Nichts steht über der Wahrheit!"= "Nothing is above the truth!"] shows his wide interests: logic, aesthetics, psychology, metaphysics, theology, occult, medicine, anthropology, paleontology, geology, cosmology, astronomy, mathematics, history, philology, ethnology, art, jurisprudence, geography, meteorology, physics, chemistry, mineralogy, botany, zoology, anatomy, physiology.


His son, ALEXANDRE SYNÈS DE HENSELER, born Geneva, 1935 and died in Montreux, 2021, studied Classics and Sanskrit at the University of Geneva and worked on a doctoral thesis on the Pre-Socratics and Upanishads at the University of Oxford. He helped edit the correspondence of Theodore de Bèze. Alexandre also wrote under a pseudonym, "Synesios". Both father and son were avid collectors of publications in the areas of philosophy and religion.




colonial official in Calcutta, who studied extensively the Sanskrit texts on chakras and then translated and annotated them.


Sir John George Woodroffe (1865-1936), also known by his pseudonym Arthur Avalon, was a British Orientalist whose extensive and complex published works on the Tantras, and other Hindu traditions, stimulated a wide-ranging interest in Hindu philosophy and yoga.

"Who is Kundalini, the Serpent Power? Mythologically, she is an aspect of the Shakti (power or energy) and consort of Shiva. Philosophically, she is the creative energy that eventually forms mind and matter, and comes to rest in the lowest form of matter. She is consciousness: the power of matter to know itself. In terms of Tantric practice, she is the mysterious power that resides in the human body and can be awakened through suitable techniques: special meditations and yogic practices of a particularly powerful nature. She is The Goddess, the ultimate heart of many areas of Eastern religion, not only of Hinduism."

"This volume, by the foremost student of Shaktic and Tantric thought, Arthur Avalon, is the prime document for the study and application of Kundalini yoga. The author covers the philosophical and mythological nature of Kundalini; the esoteric anatomy associated with it; the study of matrass -- the chakras, or psychic centers in the human body and their progressive awakening; and the yoga associated with this. This introduction, some 300 pages of unique material, is followed by translations (with long analytical commentary) of two important Tantric documents: The Description of the Six Chakras and the briefer Five-fold Footstool. 


First edition of the first volume issued (later expanded upon).

One of his most enduringly popular works was *Curious Myths of the Middle Ages*, first published in two parts during 1866 and 1868, and republished in many other editions since then. "Each of the book's twenty-four chapters deals with a particular medieval superstition and its variants and antecedents," writes critic Steven J. Mariconda. H. P. Lovecraft termed it "that curious body of medieval lore which the late Mr. Baring-Gould so effectively assembled in book form."

Includes 12 anecdotes: The Wandering Jew, Prester John, The Divining Rod, The Seven Sleepers of Ephesus, William Tell, The Dog Gellert, Tailed Men, Antichrist and Pope Joan, The Man in the Moon, The Mountain of Venus, Fatality of Numbers, The Terrestrial Paradise.



Edkins, born in Gloucestershire, was a British Protestant missionary who spent 57 years in China, 30 of them in Beijing. As a Sinologue, he specialized in Chinese religions. He was also a linguist, a translator, and a philologist. During his years in Shanghai, in July 1860 he visited the Taiping Rebellion leaders at Suzhou, Jiangsu. He made several contacts with the leaders of the "Taiping Heavenly Kingdom" in an effort to determine the precise beliefs of this movement. In late March 1861 he spent eleven days in Taiping-held Nanjing.

First edition. This work "became a landmark study and won the unanimous acclaim of both native and nonnative scholars of Hindi grammar. Now approximately a century old, it still commands the respect of scholars for being unmatched in several ways. / According to Kellogg, the grammar was written with three goals in mind: One, to present a complete account of the 'actual colloquial and literary language of the Hindus of North India.' Two, to account for the nature and extent of dialect variation in Hindi. And three, 'not merely to reproduce, under a new arrangement, the matter of grammars previously existing, but rather to supply their omissions and supplement








William Cosmo Gordon Lang, 1st Baron Lang of Lambeth, GCVO, PC was a Scottish Anglican prelate who served as Archbishop of York and Archbishop of Canterbury. His elevation to Archbishop of York, within 18 years of his ordination, was the most rapid in modern Church of England history. Robert Beaken, author of a recent biography of Archbishop Lang, calls him "Britain's first 'modern' Archbishop of Canterbury" probably recalling both his presence during WWI and his tremendous influence upon the Royal family.







While he constantly conducted Evangelical services, he labored chiefly as an educational Missionary, and was an indefatigable writer, editing Periodicals, Journals, such as the Indian Evangelical Review, publishing studies of the Hindu sacred books, etc. He was a prominent Fellow of the Calcutta University: died July 30, 1903." 
Dr. John Muir was a British Sanskrit scholar, Indologist and judge in India. Muir's main work is Original Sanskrit texts on the origin and history of the people of India, their religion and institutions (1852–1870), a study of the most important source texts of Indian cultural and religious history, with English language translation. In 1858 the first volume of his Original Sanskrit Texts (2nd ed., 1868) was published; it was on the origin of caste,

an inquiry intended to show that it did not exist in the Vedic age. The fifth and final volume was issued in 1870.

PROVENANCE: Moritz Curt Freiherr von Zedtwitz (1851-96): Curt von Zedtwitz attended high school in Zwickau. After graduating from high school in March 1869, he served as a one-year volunteer in the Saxon Army. A law student at the University of Leipzig since 1870, he took part in the Franco-Prussian War. In February 1871 he became second lieutenant in the reserve, in October 1878 Premier-Lieutenant d. R. and promoted to Rittmeister in June 1885. After the war he moved to the Ruprecht Karls University in Heidelberg and the Friedrich Wilhelms University in Berlin. After passing the First State Examination in Law on July 20, 1874, he entered the judicial service of the Kingdom of Saxony. On March 9, 1878 he passed the assessor's examination.

On April 1, 1878, he was drafted into the Foreign Service (consular career). As an auxiliary agent, he was assigned to Department II (commercial, legal and consular affairs). Admitted to the diplomatic career on April 23, 1879, he was at the Embassy in Saint Petersburg from May 1879 to January 1881. In July 1879 he passed the diplomatic examination. In May 1881 - at the time of Karl von Eisendecher – he came to the embassy in Tokyo as legation secretary. He studied Japanese music and published a collection of Japanese music in 1885. [4] In April 1885 he was sent to the legation in Stockholm and in April 1886 to the legation in Washington, DC relocated. On March 5, 1886, he received the character of Councilor of Legation. In the "Era Bleichröder" he was sent to Mexico City on July 2, 1888 as an envoy. The credentials were handed over on October 22, 1886. On March 28, 1893, he was released from the Reich service.

Curt von Zedtwitz was married since 1890 to Mary Elizabeth Breckenridge Caldwell. Together they purchased Chartreuse Castle in Hünibach, which once housed a massive library. In 1896 Zedtwitz suffered a boating accident and died.



Friedrich Max Müller, German-born philologist and Orientalist, lived and studied in Britain for most of his life. He was one of the founders of the western academic disciplines of Indian studies and religious studies

('science of religion'). Müller wrote both scholarly and popular works on the subject of Indology.

In his sixties and seventies, Müller gave a series of lectures, which reflected a more nuanced view in favour of Hinduism and the ancient literature from India. In his "What can India teach us?" lecture at University of Cambridge, he championed ancient Sanskrit literature and India as follows:

"If I were to look over the whole world to find out the country most richly endowed with all the wealth, power, and beauty that nature can bestow—in some parts a very paradise on earth—I should point to India. If I were asked under what sky the human mind has most full developed some of its choicest gifts, has most deeply pondered on the greatest problems of life, and has found solutions of some of them which well deserve the attention even of those who have studied Plato and Kant—I should point to India. And if I were to ask myself from what literature we, here in Europe, we who have been nurtured almost exclusively on the thoughts of Greeks and Romans, and of one Semitic race, the Jewish, may draw that corrective which is most wanted in order to make our inner life more perfect, more comprehensive, more universal, in fact more truly human, a life, not for this life only, but a transfigured and eternal life—again I should point to India." — Max Müller, (1883).







Limited edition of 350 copies. This "was the first comprehensive book on Kabbalah printed in the United States, and the most learned and up to date book on Kabbalah in English at the time." "His views on the history and significance of Kabbalah are based on comparative and philological-historical research. However, his interest in Kabbalah and comparative religion was not purely historical. It had a theological, spiritual aim. Myer believed that the study of Kabbalah and its ancient origins will

revive Christian mysticism, and will enable the formation of a new theology, that will reunite all divided religions." – Huss.


Some of Plantinga's most influential works include *God and Other Minds* (1967), *The Nature of Necessity* (1974), and a trilogy of books on epistemology, culminating in *Warranted Christian Belief* (2000) that was simplified in *Knowledge and Christian Belief* (2015). "In Plantinga's evolutionary argument against naturalism, he argues that if evolution is true, it undermines naturalism. His basic argument is that if evolution and naturalism are both true, human cognitive faculties evolved to produce beliefs that have survival value (maximizing one's success at the four Fs: "feeding, fleeing, fighting, and reproducing"), not necessarily to produce beliefs that are true. Thus, since human cognitive faculties are tuned to survival rather than truth in the naturalism-evolution model, there is reason to doubt the veracity of the products of those same faculties, including naturalism and evolution themselves. On the other hand, if God created man "in his image" by way of an evolutionary process (or any other means), then Plantinga argues our faculties would probably be reliable."




wisdom. Iamblichus' biography is universally acknowledged as deriving from sources of the highest antiquity. Its classic translation by Thomas Taylor was first printed in 1818 and is once again brought to light in this edition.


During Iamblichus' life, the depth and sublimity of his writing and discourse attracted a multitude of associates and disciples from all parts of the world. The Emperor Julian wrote of him, "that he was posterior indeed in time, but not in genius, to Plato," and all the Platonists who succeeded him honored him with the epithet of "divine."

Iamblichus' account of the life of Pythagoras begins with the great philosopher's birth on the island of Samos, his youth, and his wide renown in Greece. It briefly covers his early travels and his studies with the philosophers Anaximander and Thales, his twenty-two years of instruction in the temples of Egypt, and his initiation into the Egyptian and Babylonian mysteries. The later life and work of Pythagoras are richly elaborated, with humorous and profound anecdotes illustrating his philosophy and providing a unique view of community life under his tutelage in Crotona.

Included are excerpts from his teachings on harmonic science, dietetic medicine, friendship, temperance, politics, parenthood, the soul's former lives and many other topics. The book also contains substantial sections on the Fragments of the Ethical Writings (the work of very early Pythagoreans) and the Pythagoric Sentences.

The translator of this work, Thomas Taylor, is known for his authoritative translations of the Platonists; he was practically the sole source of Neo-Platonic thought in the transcendentalist movement of New England. Iamblichus' *Life of Pythagoras* was a constant source of inspiration to the transcendentalists and a major influence on their writings throughout the Nineteenth Century. Taylor's work was enthusiastically acclaimed by Emerson, who referred to the translator as "a Greek born out of his time, and dropped on the ridicule of a blind and frivolous age."







In regard to Smith's Ecce Deus, he wrote that "I have read this great book from cover to cover. It is a possession forever. Rationalist writer Joseph McCabe wrote that Reinach was "one of the leading French authorities on the science of religion, from which he removes all supernatural elements."

Salomon Reinach was a French archaeologist, religious historian and was a major figure in the Franco-Jewish establishment in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. He is described as a "Godless Jew" and influenced Sigmund Freud's *Totem and Taboo:*

"Reinach links totem and taboo in the introduction to his *Orpheus*. The Polynesian notion of taboo (or "scruple"), he writes, is one of the most fruitful ones inherited from nineteenth-century ethnography, pointing out that together with the notion of animism, it is at the root of religions and mythologies. First edition. Sir Thomas Andrew Lumisden Strange was a chief justice in Nova Scotia, known for waging "judicial war" to free Black Nova Scotian slaves from their owners. From 1789–1797, he was the sixth Chief Justice of Nova Scotia.

He compiled a 'Manual of Hindoo Law,' 1856, taking his father's work as a basis. This reached a second edition in 1863. He also published 'A Letter to the Governor of Fort St. George on Judicial Reform' (1860).

While in India he was much interested in religious subjects. In 1852 he published 'The Light of Prophecy' and 'Observations on Mr. Elliott's "Horæ Apocalypticæ." Subsequently he was so impressed by observing a supposed convert at the gallows

proclaim his faith to be in Rama, not in Christ, that, on examining Christian evidence, his own faith in Christianity broke down.


He never ceased to be a pious theist. 

After graduating from high school in March 1869, he served as a one-year volunteer in the Saxon Army. A law student at the University of Leipzig since 1870, he took part in the Franco-Prussian War. In February 1871 he became second lieutenant in the reserve, in October 1878 Premier-Lieutenant d. R. and promoted to Rittmeister in June 1885. After the war he moved to the Ruprecht Karls University in Heidelberg and the Friedrich Wilhelms University in Berlin. After passing the First State Examination in Law on July 20, 1874, he entered the judicial service of the Kingdom of Saxony. On March 9, 1878 he passed the assessor's examination.

On April 1, 1878, he was drafted into the Foreign Service (consular career). As an auxiliary agent, he was assigned to Department II (commercial, legal and consular affairs). Admitted to the diplomatic career on April 23, 1879, he was at the Embassy in Saint Petersburg from May 1879 to January 1881. In July 1879 he passed the diplomatic examination. In May 1881 - at the time of Karl von Eisendecher – he came to the embassy in Tokyo as legation secretary. He studied Japanese music and published a collection of Japanese music in 1885. [4] In April 1885 he was sent to the legation in Stockholm and in April 1886 to the legation in Washington, DC relocated. On March 5, 1886, he received the character of Councilor of Legation. In the "Era Bleichröder" he was sent to Mexico City on July 2, 1888 as an envoy. The credentials were handed over on October 22, 1886. On March 28, 1893, he was released from the Reich service.

Curt von Zedtwitz was married since 1890 to Mary Elizabeth Breckenridge Caldwell. Together they purchased Chartreuse Castle in Hünibach, which once housed a massive library. In 1896 Zedtwitz suffered a boating accident and died.

He entered the Society of Jesus in 1881 in Belgium because the order was outlawed in France at that time. Several months after his ordination in July 1887, he arrived in the mission of southeastern Chihli (roughly present-day Hebei) Province. With his medical skills, he developed a regimen of hygiene for missionaries and for the Chinese. Wieger wrote numerous books, on Chinese culture, Taoism, Buddhism and Chinese language. "In 1852, he became the first American to edit a Sanskrit text, namely the Vedanta treatises Ātmabodha and Tattvabodha. In 1853, he became professor of Sanskrit and English at the Government Sanskrit College; and in 1855 was appointed to the post of Inspector of Public Instruction in Ajmere-Merwara and in 1856 in the Central Provinces." "The Gifford Lectures are normally spread over two years. There is, then, a natural break between the first series of lectures (Chapters I–X in this book) and the second one (Chapters XI–XX). Apart from the first two chapters, which serve as an introduction, the first series sets the problem of the varieties of mystical experience and an attempt is made to find a solution largely from the Indian sources. In the second half of the book a consideration of the Taoist classics forms the link between the 'solitary' mysticism of India and the 'solidary' vision of Neo-Confucianism. This leads on to a consideration of Zen and through Zen to the medieval Christian mystics. The rest of the book is devoted to a re-appraisal of Christian doctrine in the light of the religions already studied and of the thought of some 'fringe' Catholics of the recent past from Rousseau to Bernanos and Teilhard de Chardin. The 'golden thread'





Robert Charles Zaehner, British academic, studying Eastern religions. "He understood the original language of many sacred texts, e.g., Hindu, Buddhist, Islamic. Earlier, starting in World War II, he had served as an intelligence officer in Iran. At Oxford University his first writings had been on the Zoroastrian religion and its texts. Appointed Spalding Professor, his books addressed such subjects as mystical experience, Hinduism, comparative religion, Christianity and other religions, and ethics. He translated the Bhagavad-Gita, providing an extensive commentary based on Hindu tradition and sources." [Wikip.]

Zaehner was a British Intelligence officer stationed at the British Embassy in Tehran, and the major planner of the plot leading to the overthrow of Moḥammad Mosaddeq's government [in 1953]. His parents, originally from Switzerland, had immigrated to England, where Robert was born and received his education. "In the field of Oriental studies, Zaehner's first academic love was certainly Zoroastrianism, as well as the study of the languages needed to understand this ancient faith. His work on the Good Religion counts as the most original and scientifically inspiring in his whole career." "His command of the Persian language, his actions and his lifestyle turned him into somewhat of a legend in post-war Iran: flamboyant, bon-vivant, well introduced in local society, a hard drinker, an opium smoker, he was regarded by many of his colleagues as unfit for his operational job (Louis, 2004, p. 146) and this also proved to be a limit for his activities. "One of the most celebrated Protestant missionaries of the twentieth century, Zwemer made his home in Arabia and Egypt for most of 38 years (1890-1929). Initially an evangelist, he became a writer, publisher, and peripatetic conference speaker who, as much as anyone, introduced twentieth-century Christians to Islam. The son of Dutch immigrant parents, he was born in Vriesland, Michigan, where his father was a

Reformed pastor. He graduated from Hope Academy and College (B.A. 1887; M.A., 1890) and New Brunswick Seminary (B.D., 1890) and became an early recruit of the Student Volunteer Movement (SVM). In 1889, when Zwemer and his classmate James Cantine could find no agency to send them as missionaries to Muslims, they established the American Arabian Mission, which five years later the Reformed Church agreed to sponsor. Zwemer lived for a time in the United States (1905-1910) serving primarily as a promoter, recruiter, and publicist for the Arabian Mission, field secretary for the Reformed Board, and traveling secretary for the SVM. Besides writing twenty-nine books and coauthoring another nineteen, Zwemer founded, and edited for 37 years, the journal The Moslem World. He organized two major missionary conferences on Islam, one in Cairo (1905) and one in Lucknow (1911). In 1929 Zwemer accepted the professorship of the history of religion and Christian missions at Princeton Theological Seminary, continuing in that post until 1937. After formal retirement, he moved to New York City and taught at the Biblical Seminary of New York and the Nyack Missionary Training Institute. A lifelong student of Islam, Zwemer never ceased to contend for the finality of Christ. Though unusually prolific as a writer and effective in recruiting missionaries and inspiring interest in missions, particularly in the Muslim world, Zwemer saw only a few Muslims openly profess the Christian faith." - Brown University, School of Theology.

Akin writes: Samuel Zwemer contributed more to mission work among Muslims in the Middle East and North Africa than perhaps any other individual in history. He was a faithful missionary, a fervent mobilizer, and a foundational theologian for Christian mission efforts among Muslim peoples. Though he did not see scores of Muslims trust in Jesus for salvation, church historian Kenneth Scott LaTourette wrote of him: "No one through all of the centuries of Christian missions to Moslems has deserved better than Dr. Zwemer the designation of Apostle to Islam." – J.
