


"George Bernard Shaw: His Plays (1905) is H. L. Mencken's interpretation of G. Bernard Shaw's plays, in which Mencken overwhelmingly embraced the man who was, at that time, his favourite playwright.

According to Mencken: "Through Shaw, I found my vocation at last." It is no surprise that Mencken was enthusiastic in his praise of Shaw when he wrote His Plays, but as time passed, this love would wane, and he would eventually criticize Shaw in a later work Prejudices. Mencken began work on the book in 1904, with the goal of publishing the book under John W. Luce. The body of the book is made up of summaries of Shaw's plays, with minor analysis. The entire book was slightly over 100 pages.

Perhaps the most interesting section of the book is the introduction, where Mencken injects his own personality and beliefs into the work, praising Charles Darwin, Thomas Huxley, and Herbert Spencer – all of whom he insisted influenced Shaw.

Response to the work was mixed, and Mencken made no money at all. In fact, Mencken hoped to meet with Shaw, but his letters went unanswered. Mencken assumed that this was because Shaw disliked the work, but in fact Shaw was moderately impressed – a fact Mencken only discovered years later, while writing Prejudices." [Wikip.].






"Describing roughly 10,000 books, pamphlets and periodicals, this was the first detailed, annotated bibliography of the history of printing, and one of the earliest comprehensive annotated bibliographies of any technical subject. It was completed

with the assistance of printer, historian of printing, bibliographer and book collector William Blades, and the assistance of printer and American printing historian Theodore Low De Vinne, whose historical treatise, The Invention of Printing. A Collection of Facts and Opinions was first published in 1876, and others. In particular Blades, the greatest English scholar printer of his time, turned over to the authors his comprehensive notes for a bibliography of the subject which Blades had long planned, but instead chose to have incorporated into Bigmore and Wyman's project." – Norman.






Trevor Henry Hall was a British author, surveyor, and sceptic of paranormal phenomena. Hall made controversial claims regarding early members of the *Society for Psychical Research*. His books caused a heated controversy within the parapsychology community. He had a deep interest in magic and mystery. Hall was a student in psychical research at Trinity College, Cambridge (1954–56). His knowledge of conjuring and magic helped him discover the tricks of mediums, many of whom had been caught in fraud. Hall was an ex-member and critic of the Society for Psychical Research and published a series of skeptical books on the paranormal and psychical research. He was a collector of magic books and was a member of *The Magic Circle*.

Scheffers enrolled at the University of Leipzig where he studied with Felix Klein and Sophus Lie, taking his doctorate degree in 1890. It is significant that Miss Schullian, the author of the section on incunabula and Western manuscripts, is an eminent humanistic scholar, and that the list of pre-publication subscribers includes more university libraries than medical libraries, to say nothing of institutions such as the Bodleian Library at Oxford, the Boston Athenaeum, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Pierpont Morgan Library, the Huntington Library, Das Antiquariat in Vienna, Sandberg's Bokhandel in Stockholm, and the British Embassy in Washington."

"The volume is a guide for booklovers as well as physicians, since a considerable number of the 490 incunabula and several of the Western manuscripts are non-medical. Among these are works concerning natural history, theology, philosophy, canon law, astronomy and astrology, psychology, zoology, mineralogy, history, geography, agriculture, mechanics, and literature. Among the authors represented are Aristotle, Porphyry, Cicero, Varro, Seneca, Pliny the Elder, Boethius, Isidore, Rabanus Maurus, Aquinas, Lull, Duns Scotus, Gratian, Ficino, Gerson, and Petrarch. But, lest it be inferred that the catalogue has little to do with medicine. it should be noted that the outstanding medical men of ancient, medieval, and early renaissance times are well represented. Ernst Georg Pringsheim Jr. attended the Realgymnasium in Breslau until graduating in 1902. He then studied natural sciences at the universities in Munich, Breslau and from 1904 to 1906 in Leipzig, in particular botany, zoology and chemistry. He was inspired to study physiology by his doctoral supervisor Wilhelm Pfeffer. Pringsheim received his doctorate in Leipzig in 1905. In 1906, Pringsheim became an assistant at the Institute of Plant Physiology in Breslau, but moved to the same position at the Botanical Institute of the University of Halle in the same year. In 1909 he habilitated in botany and in 1912 published a highly regarded monograph on the stimulus movements of plants. From 1920 to 1923 he was an associate professor at the University of Berlin. In 1923, Ernst Pringsheim received a salaried associate professorship at the German University of Prague, where he was appointed full professor and director of the Institute of Plant Physiology in 1924. In December 1932, Pringsheim was appointed to a chair of botany at Goethe University in Frankfurt by the Prussian Ministry of Culture. After the National Socialist seizure of power, however, he was no longer appointed. After emigrating, Pringsheim found employment in 1939 as curator of the Culture Center of Algae and Protozoa in Cambridge, now based in Oban in the UK. Emeritus in 1951, Ernst Pringsheim continued his research at the Strangeway Laboratories in Cambridge until 1953.





Alsaker published many of his "miracle health books" under a pseudonym, Frank E. Morrison before opting to use his name. Although he was a medical doctor, he excoriated the medical establishment so harshly that a 1921 JAMA article (volume 77, No. 24 pp. 1909-1910) proclaimed: "the average reader might well reach the conclusion that all other physicians, except Alsaker, are either fools or rogues, and that from Alsaker alone flows the only pure, unadulterated 100 per cent medical knowledge." Alsaker argues that organic diet and exercise, alone, are sufficient for good health, and that medicines "are a delusion and a snare" (p.74). This Order combined the London unions and parishes in to one 'Metropolitan Asylum District' to comply with the stipulations of the Metropolitan Poor Act of 29 March 1867 (30 & 31 Vict c 6). This Act provided for "the Establishment in the Metropolis of Asylums for the Sick, Insane, and other Classes of the Poor and of Dispensaries; and for the Distribution over the Metropolis of Portions of the Charge for Poor Relief; and for other Purposes relating to Poor Relief". The Metropolitan Asylum District was responsible for "the reception and relief of poor persons infected with or suffering from fever or the disease of smallpox or who may be insane".




Weaver's "gift" was in persuading Andrew Carnegie to donate the cost of constructing the building to house the Institute's library. Weaver was Chair of the library Committee for 6 years, and oversaw many of its purchases. A plaque at the library now honors his role in building the collection and securing the Carnegie gift. Brother Potamian was a brother of the Christian Schools. Before taking his vows he was named Dr. Michael O'Reilly, a physician specializing in radiotelegraphy and radiography. Due to the complexity of problems relating to the unknown possible effects of prolonged space flight on the circulatory system, these studies were vital to the success of NASA programs.



PROVENANCE: Ralph H. Kellogg (1920-2009), matriculated to the medical school at the University of Rochester, then after WWII he taught at the Dept. of Physiology at Harvard Medical School, taking his Ph.D. in 1953, then he joined UC Berkeley and then UCSF as Professor of Physiology, where he worked for more than 50 years, specializing in renal and respiratory physiology, with particular attention to physiology of high altitude. "Facilities were primitive, and they were subjects for their own experiments. Their measurements yielded additional information about the control of breathing that helps people adjust to the lack of oxygen pressure in the air. Very few physiologists in the world had laboratory facilities to work at such high altitude, and Ralph came to know most of them." He also collected rare books on mountaineering, clearly relating this interest to the study of high-altitude conditions and the human experience.



Third edition, revised and enlarged. In the absence of a time machine, this is an excellent venue for discovering how surgeries were performed during the early 19th and mid-18th centuries. Surgeon of the King's Camps and Armies, and the Director of the Royal Academy of Surgery, Legouas was a Professor of Anatomy at the University of Paris. Hirsch, III, [p. 655] states, "er ist verfasser eines zur zeit sehr beliebt gewessen Lehrbuches ser Chiurgie" [he is the author of a very popular textbook of surgery].


Physiology – hygiene – Pathology (nosology, etiology, symptomatology, semiology, illness periods, crises, convalescence – Pathology (surgical: inflammation, abscess, gangrene, necrosis, solutions, wounds, fractures, ulcers, fistulas, teeth, tumors, blood tumors, serious tumors, hernias, joint dislocations, polyps, fungus, exostosis of the bone, osteogenic sarcoma [cancer], anatomical aberrations (examples: a sixth finger, webbed-fingers, extra-large penile skin flaps, disorders of the clitoris, abnormal size of the cranium, adhering eyelids, imperfections of the ears, nostrils, cleft-lips, trunk or limbs malformed, strangulation of the testicles or penis, foreign bodies) – therapeutics (pharmaceuticals, art of writing formulas, etc., inoculation, vaccination).
